Our family operation has bred commercial hereford cattle at Curracabark since 1923 with the Curracabark Hereford stud commencing in 1950 and Myra Angus in 2000 (now Curracabark Angus). Curracabark and Myra are in a shale based valley with plenty of ridges and rocks and lower rainfall. Joining around 700 females on some fairly plain hills provides some challenges and first hand insight into the true worth of homebred and outside genetics with constitution and muscle, both vital for profit. About 50 bulls are offered for sale each year. Around 250 steers are annually sold to feedlots, 50 plus heifers are sold as future breeders, 150 heifers retained and the remaining heifers are fattened for MSA markets.

We feel that genomics is a step in the right direction and may improve some deficiencies in the EBV data system by eliminating the tendency of averaging raw data.

One of the difficulties with cattle genes is that the good performers and the underperformers share many of the same genes.

For example: if a sire has an EBV of -10 for docility, we don't know if many of his calves are nervous or an odd calf is really hot. With the odd culling, good genetic gain across the traits can be made with the second scenario only. Hopefully genomics will reduce the human factor of measurement as each operator varies in the recording of this.

Some people are questioning the current carcase scan data and considering that there is to date only about a 30% correlation of EBV data to chiller assessment it seems a valid observation.

Looking to provide better information brings up the possibility of using the American System (CUP) that perhaps doubles these correlations. It is early days yet and with slow turnaround times to get information back, it could take some time to get any uptake.

Therefore we continue to look for visual muscle along the spine, through the rump and hindquarters combined with softness and doing ability as a sure way to keep up muscle content in good doing cattle.

Having travelled south to the central districts in Victoria, west to Broken Hill and north through the New England in the last few weeks, we've seen the enormity of the currently difficult season and the various strategies of management used to cope.

The upside has been the continual strength of the market if the upper levels of performance can be achieved. This is not so easy and has required plenty of management, market timing and better performing genetics. Thus there is pretty fair reason to feel that there would be a very strong market when the season decides it's your turn, and we are all good and ready.

We still believe in upgrading genetics and with this in mind we have added six bulls this autumn to our commercial and stud bull battery plus eleven last season.

Our extensive search through Southern NSW, Victoria and South Australia for elite stud sires with actual performance, structure and good data has resulted in us purchasing, Ravensdale Trust M248 from Holbrook and in conjunction with Dalkeith Herefords, Cassilis, Kerlson Pines Keystone M004 from South Australia for \$22,000 at the Dubbo National Show and Sale 2018.

Sires of this year's Herefords include the very consistent

breeder of length with muscle in Days Columbus G20 and son K102. There are also some calves by Poll Hereford breed leader Allendale Anzac E114 who still continues to top the sale circuit at 9 years of age with Ravensdale Guardian M222 by E114 making \$32,000 at Dubbo this year. Anzac's Curracabark sons M101 and N003 look smart with good data as well.

Angus sires represented include carcase sires Musgrave Big Sky and Pathfinder bulls Goldmark D189, Goldmark G497 and Komplete K22.

Big Sky provides depth and growth with M49 and N6A perhaps

Pathfinder Goldmark G497 would be the thickest bull with size that we have seen and his son M30 looks outstanding.

Pathfinder Komplete was used with total success on heifers and brings low birth weight, thickness and constitution - a rare combination in high calving ease sires. Bald Blair Frederick, who topped the New England Sales in 2014, again has sons with constitution, length and even temperament.

We also offer a pen of Angus composite PTIC heifers and plus 45 Angus composite, Black Baldy and Hereford heifers unjoined.




